

Gene Dodaro
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As the Chief Operating Officer of the U.S. Government Accountability Office (GAO), Mr. Dodaro assists the Comptroller General in providing leadership and vision for the GAO, one of the world's most diverse multi-disciplinary professional services organizations. He is responsible for day-to-day management to ensure that GAO effectively supports the Congress and helps improve government for the benefit of the American people. He oversees the development and issuance of several hundred reports and testimonies to the Congress annually. GAO assistance provides critical information for decision making, saves billions of dollars, and results in hundreds of improvements in government operations, programs and services. Mr. Dodaro also leads the development of GAO's strategic plans and provides direction for GAO's high risk program that highlight solutions needed to address major management challenges and risks across the federal government.

Prior to assuming his current responsibilities in May 1999, Mr. Dodaro led GAO's Accounting and Information Management Division. His significant accomplishments included providing leadership to help government successfully confront the Year 2000 computing challenge by working with the Congress and the President's Y2K Conversion Council. He also directed the first-ever audit of comprehensive financial statements covering all federal departments and agencies—one of the largest and most complex audits in history. Additionally, he helped conceive GAO's strategy for improving computer security throughout government and updating internal control standards for the federal government.

He has worked closely with Congress and various administrations on major management reform initiatives and has extensive experience working on state and local government issues.

Deputy Inspector General
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Todd J. Zinser is the Deputy Inspector General for the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) Office of Inspector General (OIG).

A career federal employee, Mr. Zinser was appointed to the position in 2001 after serving on an Acting basis since May 2000. He joined DOT OIG in 1991 and has served in various leadership capacities, including Special Agent in Charge of OIG's New York regional investigations office, Deputy Assistant Inspector General for Investigations and served as Assistant Inspector General for Investigations from January 1996 until appointed Deputy Inspector General in August 2001.

As Deputy Inspector General, Mr. Zinser is responsible for the day-to-day operations and management of an office of more than 400 auditors, investigators and evaluators.

Matthew (Matt) A. Jadacki
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Mr. Matthew "Matt" Jadacki is the Special Inspector General for Gulf Coast Hurricane Recovery, under the Office of Inspector General, U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS/OIG). He joined DHS/OIG in October 2005.

The Gulf Coast Hurricane Recovery Office focuses on preventing problems through a proactive program of internal control reviews and contract audits to ensure disaster assistance funds are being spent wisely. As the Special Inspector General, Mr. Jadacki provides:

- Independent audits and investigations of disaster relief operations;
- Independent and objective leadership and coordination of, and recommendations on, policies designed to promote economy, efficiency, and effectiveness in the administration of programs and operations; prevention and detection of waste, fraud, abuse; and mismanagement in these programs and operations; and
- An independent and objective means of keeping the Congress, the Secretary of DHS, and all other federal departments and agencies involved in disaster relief fully and currently informed about problems and deficiencies relating to the administration of programs and operations, and the necessity for and progress of corrective action.

He is also responsible for coordinating the audit activities of other federal Inspectors General who have an oversight responsibility for the funds transferred to their respective departments and agencies by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to assist in the disaster relief efforts.

Prior to joining DHS, Mr. Jadacki was the Chief Financial Officer/Chief Administrative Officer (CFO/CAO) of the National Weather Service, a component of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) of the U.S. Department of Commerce (DOC). Before the National Weather Service, Mr. Jadacki was the Acting CFO of FEMA, managing eleven branches with over 200 employees and a \$12 billion budget. Prior to FEMA, he worked in the U.S. Department of State from 1987 to 1991 as an Audit Manager and in DOC as an Operating Accountant/Auditor from 1981 to 1987.

Mr. Jadacki holds a B.S. in Business Management from the University of Maryland, College Park, Maryland, and is both a Certified Public Accountant and Certified Government Financial Manager. He holds memberships in a number of societies, including the Association of Government Accountants, the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, and the Virginia Society of Certified Public Accountants.

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For more than a decade, Bernice Steinhardt has held a variety of leadership positions within the U.S Government Accountability Office (GAO), Congress' analytic and investigative arm. Managing Director
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Norman Rabkin was named Managing Director for Homeland Security and Justice by Comptroller General David Walker in January 2003. In this position, he manages GAO's reviews of issues related to homeland security, federal law enforcement agencies including the Federal Bureau of Investigations and the Drug Enforcement Agency; the federal judiciary; and federal funds provided to state and local law enforcement agencies. He was also involved in audits of the Federal Trade Commission and the National Cancer Institute.
